And when the flowers on the other trees transform themselves into fruits, the flowers of the tree-of-things simply disappear, and nothing replaces them. The reader will be guided by María José Ferrada's poetic words

and Miguel Pang Ly's amazing and whimsical illustrations. Debutante illustrator, Miguel Pang Ly has already been remarked at the 2014 Bologna Illustrator Exhibit for his first book, La Invasion Marciana.

Indeed at dusk, between the night breeze and the morning buzzing, a cow leaves town and goes back to the meadow. A delicate tale written by Juan Arjona and illustrated by Luciano Lozano that makes us think about the strength of the destiny and the power of coincidence that sometimes make our life a little bit more unpredictable, surprising and easy.

El Rio de los Cocodrilos by Gustavo Roldán

Without a shadow of a doubt, the river is the best place for a crocodile, at least this is what the elderly crocodile thinks as the river's current gently rocks him. But one day, a Mister in a red suit reaches the crocodiles' river, putting forward a contract and a little bottle of water taken out of the river that

he has just bought: he is the new river owner and the crocodile must leave at once. But the elderly crocodile does not agree with him...

Gustavo Roldán tells a simple story that reminds us that there are things that you can't sell nor buy. And as always, he shapes this story through lively dialogues and minimalistic, forceful, dynamic and expressive illustrations.

And one winter night, both kingdoms decided to conquer each other. As all the people of the first kingdom crossed the Eastern bridge, the people of the second kingdom crossed the Westerd bridge. And by the time they arrived, as it was late and snowing, they decided to sleep in their oponents' houses. Each combatant chose the house that looked most like his own house in the other kingdom.

That day the king of the first kingdom and the queen of the other one, began negotiating, but as days passed, they reached no agreement. As time went by, the new inhabitants started fixing their new homes and making them more their own. One afternoon the old father of the blacksmith crossed the bridge to fetch something he had left in his old home. As he arrived in time for dinner, the new family living in his house, invited him to stay for dinner. From that day on, people started crossing the river, some returned to their old home, some kept the new one, while others

YA. NUNCA by Grassa Toro & Cecilia Morena

In this book words and images intertwine with each other in a poetic way to shape a person's journey through life. Some things in life mark a deep change between the past and the future to come, things that, once you do them, change your understanding and vision of the world. ALREADY. NEVER is a book that is built upon a couple of sentences: the things the narrator has already done and the ones he'll never do, and whose meaning come to life thanks to an image that dialogues both with the impossible and the lost innocence. Thus the reader naturally begins a contemplative process, which rhythm is established by the inquiries and the silence of a black human shape. A poetic book that invites the reader to a philosophical meditation




Chingolo by Silvina Ocampo



Poemas de las Madres by Gabriela Mistral & Cecilia Afonso Esteves

"Poems of mothers" of Gabriela Mistral, 1945 Nobel prize, was published only once in 1950 and, until now, had fallen into a kind of nebula. For this reason, and with the clear desire to recover this endearing work, Quilombo Ediciones, true to its mission and vision of the illustrated book, has decided to publish a new edition of this title. The illustrations of Cecilia Afonso Esteves, Argentina prominent illustrator not only reinforce the intimate message of Mistral's poetry, but also stand as a work on its own.

This title, which contains 19 poems dedicated to mothers, are accompanied by various flowers, creating a wildlife language very close to the world of the poet.






Isak's Fairy Tales by Sandra Isaksson



The Cloth of the Mother Goddess by Gita Wolf & Jagdish Chitara

"The arts which admit of exact reproduction are such that the disciple is on the same level as the creator, and so it is with their fruits..." said the great Leonardo Da Vinci. Interestingly, this idea also permeates a great deal of non-mimetic 'folk' art, the creation of artists from various rural communities around India. This book tells the story of the origins of Mata-Ni-Pachedi, the ritual Cloth of the Mother Goddess. Traditionally created by artisans from the nomadic Waghari community in Gujarat, these votive

cloths offer a painted image of the goddess to herself. Gifting a piece of creation to the creator is considered the highest form of worship. Hand block-printed on textile, this limited-edition artists' book is in the form of a cloth shrine. It pays tribute not only to a sublime conception of

This picture scroll book has been painted by Rohima Chitrikas, a young Patua scroll painter from West Bengal. In one seamless stream of images, she captures everyday life among the Santhals, one of India's oldest communities. Painting the Gods by Gita Wolf & Harsingh Hamir

"People from the Rathwa tribe in Gujarat create a ritual wall painting as a way of worshipping their gods Pithora and Pithori, depicted in the form of horses. The creation of Pithora paintings is considered a form of worship, to keep away ill-luck and invite good fortune. To paint is to mirror—and honour—all that has been created in the universe. This sophisticated conception of the transformative power of art has been rendered into a deceptively simple children's tale by Rathwa artist Harsingh Hamir, with text by Gita wolf. 



